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Why Mentorship?

The concept of mentoring is brought out in a number of places throughout Scripture, and when I think of examples in Scripture of good pictures of what mentoring ought to look like, there are two distinct pictures that come to mind: the mentoring relationship that Paul had with Timothy and that Naomi had with Ruth.

2 Timothy 2:15 says, "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who has no need to be ashamed rightly handling the word of truth." Here Paul is instructing Timothy on how to present himself before God and how he ought to mature in his faith. From verse 14 to the end of the chapter (and in other parts of the letter), Paul not only guides Timothy on how to mature in the faith but also on how he was to go about practicing his particular vocation. In 2 Timothy 2:21, Paul emphasizes to his son in the faith that his character must be one of holiness, and that it is his character that will determine how effective he will be as a worker of the Lord.

Naomi and Ruth portray another great picture of true mentorship. Naomi's maturity and motherly wisdom helped Ruth make wise choices. In the third chapter of the book of Ruth, Naomi guided Ruth on how best to conduct herself with her potential suitor Boaz, who later became her husband.

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This is true mentoring, and in it we see Naomi actively involved in her daughter in-law's life and, with her wisdom, guiding Ruth in making wise choices in her life. Paul, likewise, was consistently and intimately involved in Timothy's maturing faith and how he ought to have lived out that faith.

As African Christian University, mentoring is one of our core values. The ACU faculty and staff strive to lead by these examples by building relationships with the students and

pouring into their lives. Each of the faculty and staff take on a small group of students that they intentionally mentor in the faith through all



curricular and supra-curricular activities on a weekly basis.
