ACU Education degree

The Education Programme at African Christian University offers students an opportunity to understand what Education is all about. The overall conceptualisation of education is imparted to the students and then they

are allowed to specialise in any of the three areas of education: Early Childhood, Primary Education and Secondary Education. Students are able to make their choices, in terms of specialisation, in their second year of study. As can be deduced, each specialisation requires students to acquire special knowledge and skills to deliver in their respective disciplines in a given teaching environment. Essentially, the university prepares undergraduates to be educators at the three levels: Early Childhood, Primary Education and Secondary Education. The student chooses only one of the three.

The advantage that students have is that all undergraduates at ACU, in their first year, study the core curriculum courses which prepare them for the respective degree programmes for which they are registered. In the

first year therefore, students study Composition, i.e. Academic Writing; in the third term of their first year, they study Research Writing. The other courses are: History of Thought, i.e. an introduction to Philosophy; Latin, to harness their epistemology. Foundation of Science, Mathematics for Liberal Arts and Theology. These are offered as part of the freshman's courses.

The degree programme also offers additional core programmes which are taken in the third and fourth year. These are God, Marriage and Family, Vocational Evangelism, Christian Leadership, Entrepreneurship, Education as a business and mission. Of necessity, the university prepares the graduates to be relevant to their community and the nation as a whole. One of the courses addresses contemporary issues in Education and how these can be addressed. Elective courses are offered and the university is responsive to the relevant contemporary issues. The programme requires that students pursuing a degree programme write a dissertation and undertake a practicum in the relative teaching subject. We anticipate that our graduates will eventually assume executive positions wherever they will be. The degree programme therefore has courses in Curriculum Design and School Management.

In his book *“Teaching to Change Lives, Seven Proven Ways to make Your Teaching Come Alive”* Revised Edition (1987) Dr. Howard Hendricks states: “The way people learn determines how you teach.” The cardinal question that emerges from this assertion is, “How do people learn?” The Bible does not mince words in response to the process of acquiring knowledge. To learn something is to have knowledge of that thing; and the use of that knowledge is what constitutes wisdom. The Bible is apt in defining “knowledge” and “wisdom” as *“The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is understanding.”* Proverbs 9:10 New King James Version (NKJV). Interestingly, the Bible has no kind words for people who attribute to themselves as the source of knowledge: *“Proverbs 1:7 “The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and instruction.”* Like all degree programmes at ACU, the education degree programme acknowledges and demonstrates that all knowledge and wisdom are from God. The programme therefore offers

what is known about the discipline as revealed to us by the Creator and the pedagogical aspects of the natural and social sciences. The question that is being **answered** as we deliver the course material in Education is: How do people learn? We respond by teaching them how we can make them learn. The classic Socratic approach has stood the taste of time and the course content is viewed from the biblical worldview.
